

Sr. Matthea Husmillo Pronounces Final Vows

Despite the continuing pandemic and the political turmoil in the country, God still intervenes. On the 4th of September 2021, Saturday, a day dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, Sr. Matthea A. Husmillo, OSB of the Diocese of Legazpi, committed her whole self to God in perpetuity at 9:00 AM at the chapel of St. Scholastica's Formation House, Tagaytay City. The Eucharistic celebration with the rite of final profession was presided by Fr. Anselm Manalastas, OSB.

Because of the government imposed travel restrictions and health risks caused by the pandemic, no guests attended the rites except for M. Mary Thomas Prado, OSB and the Sisters from the Manila and Priory



House communities who had liturgical roles. Even Sr. Matthea's family members and friends could not be physically present. Because the whole affair was live streamed via the Facebook page of the Manila Priory all the Sisters in the different communities here and abroad and countless family members and friends were able to witness this grace-filled event.

We thank M. Maoro Sye & the General Council, and M. Mary Thomas the Priory Government for welcoming and accepting Sr. Matthea as a full-pledged member of the



Congregation. Moreover, we thank the Lord of the harvest for calling Sr. Matthea in our missionary Benedictine way of life in total self-surrender assuring her of our prayers. Her final profession of vows is just the beginning of her journey with God's people as she assumes her new mission assignment in Ormoc City, Leyte.

Eight-Volume Revised LOH Completed By: Sr. Pia Lansang, OSB

The eight-volume Liturgy of the Hours (LOH) revised series was finally completed with the arrival of the last volume last August 25, 2021. Considering how the liturgy largely defines our life as Benedictines, we realize the significance of updating our LOH books at this time. This revised series replaces the previous editions of 1993 and 1995 based on the 1984 original version.

The new set generally retains Sr. Mary Placid Abejo's original musical settings of antiphons and tonuses. A few select compositions by our Sisters of the Canticles for solemn Benedictus, Magnificat, and the Nunc Dimittis for Lauds, Vespers, and Compline respectively have likewise been retained. This 8-volume series consists of the following: Volume I - Advent and Christmas; Volume II A - Ordinary Time (Weeks 1 - 17); Volume II B - Ordinary Time (Weeks 18 - 34); Volume III - Lent; Volume IV- Easter; Volume V - Solemnities and Feasts; Volume VI-Midday Prayer; Volume VII - Compline; and Volume VIII - Office of Readings.

Sr. Imelda O. Halili, OSB was commissioned by then Prioress M. Adelaida Ygrubay, OSB to work on the revisions as the former was ending her 3-year term as Priory Procurator in 2016. She began work in August of that same year. Several meetings were conducted with the Priory Liturgy Commission (PLC) to discuss the details and mechanics of the revision. An important mandate was that it should be user-friendly and that it should not be bulky like the current edition. Hence, the importance of using Bible paper (scritta paper). Except for the Compline book, a decision was made to have the rest of the volumes done by Bundo Press of Waegwan Abbey in South Korea which is known for its excellent workmanship.

Sr. Imelda traveled to Seoul to make initial arrangements and to meet with the press staff. Due to the pandemic, she was unable to go back to supervise the printing of subsequent volumes. Thanks to technology, the drafts for these were sent back and forth via email since the press already had the format from the first volume. A series of shipments were made through a forwarding company, and thankfully all the books arrived with no hitches.

Volume I came out of the press in time for Advent 2017. Work for the succeeding volumes was done from 2017 to 2021. The last volume (Volume VIII - Office of Readings) was completed in July 2021 and was received in the Philippines in August, just in time for Foundation Day.

It is with hope that the revised LOH series will serve the next generations. In joy and thanksgiving, we have turned a new page of liturgical history on our Priory. May our voices and hearts echo as one.



New Cardinal Opens the School Year with a Mass

St. Scholastica's College's new Academic Year 2021 – 2022 was opened by two Eucharistic celebrations, both presided over by the new Archbishop of Manila, His Eminence Jose Cardinal Advincula. The first was live-streamed from the Manila Cathedral on August 23, 2021 and was sponsored by RCAMES (Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Manila Educational



System and CEAP NCR (Catholic Educational Association of the Philippines, National Capital Region) schools. The second one was held on September 3, 2021 right here in our school chapel itself. It was made possible through the perseverance of Ms Felina "Nette" Ilao, Coordinator of the High School Campus Ministry Office, who this year is also the Coordinator of the Institutional Campus Ministry Team. She was the one who constantly communicated with Fr. Mico Dellera, the Cardinal's secretary. Since the date was within the declaration of MECQ in Manila, it took some time before a decision was made as to whether the Cardinal would personally come to us or stay where he is and celebrate the mass via zoom. Finally it was agreed upon that strict health protocols would be observed: only a few attendees, physical distancing, no close, personal greetings, no offertory procession, no serving of food after the mass. Only then that the secretary gave a green light for the Cardinal to come over to the school.

When the Cardinal entered the chapel together with Fr. Mico and Fr. Pericles Fajardo, both from Capiz also, he spoke briefly to Sr. Christine Pinto, OSB and M. Mary Thomas Prado, OSB who were seated up front. Only Ms Nette Ilao came as commentator, and two AVC personnel to manage the equipment for live-streaming. The members of the Sisters' choir stayed near the organist, Sr. Imelda, OSB at the side, so only a few of the sisters could be seen in the middle of the chapel. The choir sang the Kyrie and Agnus Dei in Gregorian chant in honor of St. Gregory the Great whose feastday we commemorated that day. When



Sr. Christine gave her words of thanksgiving, she called on all the sisters and with proper distancing, were told to bow to the Cardinal who, in turn, bowed to them and waved his hand. After the mass, the Cardinal on his way out, stopped and talked spontaneously about his affinity with St. Scholastica's College and the Priory House Community. He said that in the 1980's he used to celebrate mass in this chapel while he was studying in De La Salle University. He mentioned Ms. Cory del Rosario of the Guidance Department as one of his classmates. The family rented a boarding house near the vicinity and one of his brothers used to play basketball in our old gym. That gesture endeared him to us. It was followed by picture taking again with physical distancing. He left with a promise that he will come back to celebrate the Eucharist with us and have an agape with the Sisters.





BREAD Program Helps Needy Survive Pandemic & Disasters By: Sr. Theodora Bilocura, OSB

Navigating through 2021 amidst the continuing pandemic since January 2020, the Sisters of the Manila Priory devised a more effective program to address the immediate needs for the survival of individuals, families, and communities who experienced serious illnesses and job losses.

Thus, the Priory project entitled **B**egetting **R**elief and Express Assistance for the **D**eprived (BREAD for short) was born. This program was made possible through coordination and collaboration with the Sisters of the different communities and lay mission partners of the social centers who spontaneously responded to the call to feed the hungry amid continued outbreaks and lockdowns. The present



situation was further complicated by natural calamities like tropical storms which come at an average of 20 to 24 times per year, and earthquakes.

To date, around 150 – 200 + packed meals are being distributed regularly on a weekly basis to the different sectors: slum dwellers, street children, homeless, vendors, public transport drivers, front-liners in hospitals, and security guards, among others. Moreover, truckloads of relief goods, clothes, and food packs consisting of rice, canned goods, coffee, noodles, etc. are readily distributed to typhoon and disaster survivors in Metro Manila, Camarines Sur and other parts of the Bicol region, Rizal Province and Cagayan Valley, and other affected areas. Whenever needed, cash assistance is also extended to the indigenous people (Dumagats) for income-generating projects for daily subsistence.

Faced with challenges as high as Mt. Everest, and with our faith the size of a mustard seed grain, we are spirited with enough strength, enthusiasm and hope to serve the disadvantaged, the neglected, and all those in the fringes of society.

We are ever grateful to our donors and their boundless compassion and generosity. We also thank our partners and volunteers who help us in each activity in serving those in need and feeding the hungry.

Praying the Rosary Daily with the Barangay By Sr. M. Isabel Orito, OSB

The reality of the pandemic sank into the consciousness of the Sisters of the Manila Community and they opted to show their solidarity with the people of the barangay where they belong during the pandemic. Thus, the praying of the rosary in Filipino with the residents of **Barangay 728**, **Zone 79** on a daily basis every 5: oo P.M started March 31, 2020. With the grace of God, it is continuing up to this time of writing in coordination with the local officials.

With the sound systems installed at Gate 6 of St. Scholastica's College (SSC-M), the people sat down in a line on the other side of the street facing the altar, but later on, because of fear of the virus, they were told to remain in their houses. The rosary was livestreamed for everybody to join in. In the beginning the Sisters prepared everything for praying the rosary daily: fixing the altar table, playing the organ, recitation of the rosary and the different intentions, etc. To date, volunteers from the barangay and from the school itself manage everything, even when the Sisters are unable



to attend because of conflict in schedule, the rosary goes on air. On special feasts, the Sisters share rosary beads, St. Benedict medals and simple snack with the people.

While praying the rosary, we notice the people who pass by regularly in bicycles, motorcycles, cars, and those on foot, look in our direction, at the altar and make the sign of the cross. Others would even touch the statue. A few would raise their arm toward the altar as if the gesture, like a magnet, will attract the graces they would need. There are of course those who just pass by hurriedly. Surprisingly, we also noticed that there are more men and boys who make the sign of the cross than women and girls. We gave them food. One day, one of them with his belongings in plastic bags dropped on his knees before the cross and uttered: 'I



surrender!' He was given a chair and later on food and would come regularly. Now he knows how to pray the rosary with his own beads. When he became demanding, we explained to him that he survived before meeting us and that there are other people who also need our help. He understood and comes to pray the rosary not because of the food given to him but also because he has found meaning in it. He appreciates it when we give him food at times.

The daily rosary with our Barangay 728, Zone 79 has accomplished the goal of building solidarity and unity with people outside our walls as symbolized by opening Gate 6 every afternoon and even beyond, to friends who received the link to the daily event.



As part of our mental wellness and bonding with each other, the San Fernando community visited **Bale-balayan: A Museum for the Poor**, located at 4022 Araw Malansik Street, Sta. Teresita, Angeles City, and Pampanga for an outing . Peter de Vera, a performing artist and a faculty member



of St. Scholastica's Academy, San Fernando, Pampanga is the owner of Bale-Balayan. The museum has an enormous collection of fabric, paintings, and wood carvings. It has also collections of native costumes and musical instruments from the different tribes in the country.

Bale-balayan is a haven for aspiring and talented underprivileged children around Angeles city. Street kids learn indigenous dances and music for free while uplifting their socio -economic status. Because of their training, they get invited to far-flung places to perform, opening the opportunity for them to gain scholarships. Mr. de Vera's advocacy of transforming the youth through the Arts have reaped its fruits when their group won Best in Production in the Cultural Center of the Philippines (CCP) entitled, "Kutitap: Isang Piging ng Kabataang Masining". Three (3) young performers entertained us as they played their indigenous bamboo instruments and a song rendered by Paolo, a nine-year-old boy.

The museum has a meditation room named, 'Bale Panalangin' (House of Prayer) where the images of Asian Religious icons, including an image of Our Lady of Monserrat and Stations of the Cross are displayed. At the end of the tour and socials, the community prayed Midday prayer in the prayer room.

With a gesture of gratitude and appreciation for our visit, the Sisters were given "pabaon" (food for the journey) for lunch and snacks. We thank God for the special blessing from our Lord through our generous and good teacher-friend Peter de Vera.

Philberth Brothers Help Educate Filipino Youth By: Sr. Ana Maria Raca, OSB

The Manila Priory has been sponsoring college scholars every school year from financially challenged families all over the country through the Philberth Scholarship Program. In the 35th year



of the program this 2021, we would like to pay tribute to its founders, the brothers, Fr. Bernhard Josef Philberth and Fr. Karl Friedrich Philberth.

Fr. Bernhard Philberth (March 26, 1927 – August 8, 2010) was a German physicist and a Catholic priest. Fr. Bernhard, who died at the age of 83, had always looked so ordinary from the outside but so extraordinary from the within. His brother Fr. Karl, also a physicist and a Catholic priest is now 92 years old and lives in Germany.

Both are acclaimed scientists - Fr. Bernhard received international recognition through his project of disposing radioactive waste in ice sheets and Fr. Karl initiated and headed the thermal drilling program of the International Glaciological Greenland Expedition. The proceeds of more than 100 patents of their physical and technical inventions formed the bulk of investments in what is now the "*Philberth Foundation* (PhF)." These brother-priests and acclaimed scientists believe that "all very important discoveries were not meant to end in themselves but were to lead towards the Lord of creation."

From a written account of the late Sr. Soledad Hilado, she narrated that Fr. Bernhard asked her if he could have a scholarship program like in St. Scholastica's College - Manila because he had big income that he did not know what to do with. That was in 1985 in New Norcia, Western Australia.

A subsequent visit of Fr. Bernhard to the Philippines opened his eyes to the plight of the poor and saw their determination to pursue tertiary education despite all odds. And so, in 1986, Fr. Bernhard and Fr. Karl set up what they called the Philippines Foundation (PhF) to enable the poor to gain a college education and become professionals. The only criteria for the scholarship are "need" and "worthiness". For them, "this is a most effective means of aid with benefits reaching far into the future." As time passed by, the PhF was referred to by the sisters and the scholars as **Philberth Foundation (PhF)**. Since then the administration and allocation of funds of the PhF has been managed by the Missionary Benedictine Sisters of the Manila Priory. The Priory established the PhF Foundation Committee that set up guidelines and policies on this scholarship program which has evolved through the years.

From one scholar in 1986, the numbers multiplied, until it reached 500 scholars in school year 2012. At present, there are more than 2,000 scholars who have obtained a college degree, have found decent employment, and have improved the quality of life of their families. A number of them are now working in various Benedictine institutions as teachers, nurses, medical technologists, social workers, office staff, and in other income-earning capacities. Some have found employment abroad. One became a Missionary Benedictine Sister.


