SUPERIORS AND FORMATORS MEET

The Superiors and Formators of the Manila Priory and the members of the Priory Government gathered for a six-day meeting from September 28-October 3, 2023, at St. Scholastica's Center of Spirituality, Tagaytay City. M. Mary Thomas Prado, OSB, in her Welcome Address, mentioned that "it is not just another meeting, but a gathering of sisters tasked with the service of authority- of animating and renewing our sisters and most of all, tasked to be co-discerners in shaping the life and mission of our Priory".

It was a privileged time for all to listen to the reports of the communities and the implementing arms, the Procurator, and the Prioress. Sharing in groups took place after the presentation of all the reports. Each group was tasked to identify the trends we see in our Priory today and our response to these trends. There are blessings to celebrate and challenges to face in our life as a priory especially in our different apostolates. The need to constantly listen to the signs of the times is truly vital.

Sr. Sonia Punzalan, RC, an octogenarian with more than five decades as a religious and is actively engaged in Mindfulness for lay, religious and clergy, was invited to give an enriching talk on Mindfulness and Prayer. It was interesting to know that the amygdala, known as our brain's "fight or flight" center and the seat of our fearful and anxious emotions, decreases brain cell volume after mindfulness practice. Mindfulness over time can make the brain, and thus, us, more efficient regulators of our reactions which allows less reactivity and with a better disposition to take a step back, become more aware, more accepting, less judgmental, and less reactive. We need to recover this fundamental element of our monastic tradition, thus, starting next year as announced by M. Mary Thomas, our thrust in Ongoing Formation will be on mindfulness.

Ma. Concepcion "Chichi" T. Sangil, who co-founded Cyber Guardians Philippines (CGPH) and is currently acting as the Executive Director of CGPH Incorporated works closely with Sr. Mary John Mananzan, OSB, CGPH chairperson. She oriented us on the work of cyber guardians. CGPH is a Non-Government Organization that advocates Anti-Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children (OSAEC). The Philippines has become a hotspot for online sexual abuse and exploitation. The challenge remains: to combat OSAEC and work together to co-create cybersafe homes and cybersafe schools.

The meeting concluded with a Wheel Prayer Ritual where each one was given a key to symbolize the unlocking of the synodal space and engaging in dialogue and discernment with our community members, much like the spokes of a bicycle wheel, to work together to create forward movement and balance. Our mission continues and we journey as one in serving our people and giving authentic witness to our monastic and missionary calling. That in all things God may be glorified!

SISTERS' ANNUAL RETREAT

Juan Percy Bacani, MJ, former Provincial of the Congregation of Missionaries of Jesus and President of Maryhill School of Theology, facilitated the 8-day retreat in clusters. The first cluster coordinated by Sr. Isabel Orito, OSB and attended Sisters by 72 on



September 20-27, 2023 held at St. Scholastica's Center of Spirituality in Tagaytay City. The second cluster was coordinated by Sr. Antonia Santiago, OSB, and was attended by 30 Sisters on October 1-8, 2023. They traveled all the way to the Jesuit Retreat House in Cebu City. The running theme immersed all the participants into a process on Synodality and Mission with focus on Ecological Context and Perspective.

Then the big challenge of the shared mission was posted, that of "breaking the barriers" as we journey together making room for intercultural living and to cultivate *sensus fidei*. This simply means recognizing Christ in one another as Pope Francis says, "begin to dream again as a community and look ahead to see what is good for humanity."

The entire process led the participants to hold on to the household of Earth as the context in which we all live, work and pray together as a community of Missionary Benedictines. Crocheting Workshop: The Work of Our Hands

Crochet is one of the Ongoing Formation (OGF) activities that brought Sisters together both physically in the Priory House led by M. Mary Thomas Prado, OSB, Sr. Rosalina Fajardo, OSB and around 25 sisters and more or less 40 participants virtually (via zoom) from our sisters nationwide and oblates last August 19, 2023. The program started with a prayer and a brief informative crochet history by Sr. Isabel. She mentioned that the word 'CROCHET' comes from the French word 'CROCHE' meaning Hook and started from the humble beginnings of shepherds who would create

slipstitch-textured fabric for a warm and naturally waterproof garment. It was fascinating to know that while shepherds pastured their sheep, they would be seen with a yarn and hook maybe under a tree or just simply sitting on the fields.

Sr. Mary Emmanuel Espera, OSB introduced our resource speaker, Ms. Jill Ann Dayag, currently a faculty of St. Scholastica's Academy, Marikina who teaches Home



Economics to Grade 7 and Grade 9 students. Ms. Dayag discussed the basic information we need to know about crochet like, what the essential supplies are needed for a beginner. These include the hook, yarn, stitch marker, scissors and crochet needle. She also provided a table guide, which mentions the proper hook and yarn to be used. She advised the beginners to get a yarn of medium thickness, preferably light colored that goes with a 4mm - 6mm hook size. She also introduced two ways to hold our hooks either pencil grip or knife grip, whichever is comfortable for the user. Most of our sisters have a background in crocheting during their school days and would like to re-learn the craft. Who knows, by December we might receive something warm and stylish from them. Crocheting is also a good way to relieve one's stress and anxiety in a more productive and creative way.



After the discussion, we were instructed to get our hook and yarn ready for a step-by-step guide starting from slipstitch to lock our yarn followed by a chain stitch to begin our foundation row. It was quite hard to control the hook and it was tricky to manage the tension of the yarn—to make it not too loose or too tight in order to produce balanced and even-sized stitches. Next to the chain stitch is the single crochet, which builds up the stitches from the

base. Our goal was to make a headband; for this, ten chain stitches were needed, then continue with a single crochet until we have the desired length corresponding to the circumference of our heads. What is fun to know is how we can make different products from just these three basic stitches like a scarf, blanket, bonnet, tote bag and many more. The spirit of arts and crafts truly dwelt in our activity room as all Sisters, even those online, were seen to be very focused and

determined to make our projects beautiful.

We are grateful to the OGF team and our speaker Ms. Dayag, who made this activity possible for a new learning and for us to be able to make useful items for our community. We also thank M. Mary Thomas for her generosity in providing our crochet materials, which we were also able to bring home after our activity. May our good Lord continue to bless the work of our hands and make crochet a way to bring God's grace to others making it a crochet with a purpose. That in all things, God may be glorified!

Health Care Campaign for Babies

A project of Pru Life UK in celebration of their 175th anniversary became a joint endeavor with the Formation House which covered a diagnosis benefit and death benefit for infants, ages 7 days to 11 months old who are infected with malaria, dengue, typhoid and measles. The free insurance lasts for 6 months from the date of registration. It was our task to look for the babies and their mothers, a minimum of 20 participants and Pru Life would send its speakers for the seminar which was held in the Formation House. The mission was assigned to Postulant Ma. Joanne Zamudio, who communicated with the contact person, Ms Maricel Estavillo. Starting on the last week of July, every Saturday, Joanne walked from house to house among the surrounding barangays of our community to look for poor families with babies who fit the criteria and whose mothers were interested.

As a result, on the morning of September 19, 2023, 25 mothers, some with their babies, including a grandmother baby-sitter, came to the Formation House. After the opening prayer led by Postulant Ma. Joanne, Sr. Mary Vincent Feliciano, OSB welcomed the group and explained how the invitation to organize the event came via email, which showed a flyer about a similar event held in Cebu City. If interested, contact details were given to be able to pursue the project in Tagaytay.

From Pru Life came Ms. Maricel, assisted by Ms. Hannah, who introduced Pru Life UK. Their partner insurance agent, Ms. Jonah, gave a talk on Financial Literacy, educating families on financial management. She encouraged the women to create a budget, have savings, invest early and avoid debts. Therefore, an insurance can be helpful in times of sickness, accident, disability and death, or can provide their children proper education. She moved on to introduce other insurance plans offered by Pru Life UK.



JUNIORATE UPDATES

Immersion with Women Workers in Parañaque

On August 1 – 4, 2023, the two junior sisters, Sr. Amanda Marie Fondevilla, and Sr. Sophia Marie De Guzman, underwent their immersion experience with poor women workers, as part of their curriculum requirements at the Institute of Formation and Religious Studies (IFRS). Aside from the women workers' sector, the other sectors for exposure (where the other students went) were Farmers and Indigenous Peoples, Fisherfolk, and Street Families.



The Urban Missionaries of the Philippines (UMP)

and Kababaihang Yumayanong Tungo SA Kagalingan (KAYUMANGGI) coordinated the immersion experience with women workers through the Community involvement Program (CIP) of the IFRS. UMP is one of the affiliates of the Association of Major Religious Superiors of the Philippines (AMRSP). KAYUMANGGI is a community-based organization of women in Sunnyvale, Parañaque City, where the juniors spent a few days living and interacting with the resident families. Each of us had a different host family. Aside from Sr. Amanda and Sr. Sophia, there were 5 exposurists in the women workers' sector, including two Holy Spirit Sisters (SSpS), and an Augustinian Sister (OSA). One SSpS Sister was a perpetually professed sister from Papua New Guinea.

Many of the women are factory workers on short-term contracts that last only 5-months, renewable at the discretion of the employer. This allows the employer to keep hiring workers without incurring additional costs required by law for regular workers, such as social security and health benefits. Salary levels are also at "piece-rate", instead of the standardized daily wage. A contractual worker is also not allowed to join or form unions with other workers, and is often left without an avenue to voice concerns or fight for her rights. The other women we met are also members of the "informal sector", those who have very small businesses formally registered with the government, like a little store at home, or who make a living by sewing and selling rags, or repairing umbrellas. The income from these endeavors is meant to augment the already meager income of their husbands, who, like most residents of the immersion area, are workers in the nearby factories.



The exposure-immersion experience was processed and wrapped up by Ms. Sheba Martinez, CIP officer of IFRS. The hope and objective of this program were to provide a concrete context for our studies, and a deeper awareness of what was being asked of us as religious, missionaries, and student-theologians.

Juniors attend Leadership Training at IFRS

Sr. Amanda Marie and Sr. Sophia Marie attended a two-day Leadership Training Program, conducted by the IFRS (Institute of Formation and Religious Studies) for new students on August 26 – 27, 2023. Some thirty (30) students from different congregations attended the program. It comprised of various team-building activities, such as tower-building, collage-making, an activity called "Crossing the Bridge Together", as well as lectures on leadership based on the four pillars of IFRS education. These four are: contextual, inclusive, integrated, and transformational.

The training was concluded with the nomination of candidates for the Student Coordinating Team (SCT), the IFRS equivalent of a student council. This was followed by the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. As of this writing, Sr. Amanda Marie has been voted as Secretary, and Sr. Sophia Marie has been voted as the new Coordinator of the Socials Committee.







Juniorate Returns to the Priory House By Sr. Amanda Marie Fondevilla, OSB

On July 22, 2023, at around 9:00 in the morning, Sr. Rosalina Fajardo, OSB, Sub-prioress and Junior Directress, arrived at St. Scholastica's Formation House in Tagaytay to fetch the two newly professed sisters, Sr. Amanda Marie and Sr. Sophia Marie, and bring them to the Priory House in Manila. Sr. Remedios de los Reyes, OSB, who had just finished her home leave and was set to fly back to Namibia, accompanied Sr. Rosalina, and was able to meet the Formation House Community, as well as the two juniors.

The Juniorate was formerly housed in Tagaytay, together





with the Novitiate and Pre-Novitiate Communities, but will now be re-integrated with the Priory House community, a few years after the Priory Government returned to Manila from Tagaytay. Full transfer of the Juniorate, including the furniture, library, etc. is expected in a few months' time, upon completion of repairs and renovation work in the Juniorate area.

included ten (10) alumnae from Batch '82 of St. Scholastica's College, Manila who are generous supporters of TSB and its programs, ten (10) Oblates, and twenty (20) other guests and friends.

Games with and for the homeless guests followed right after the opening program, blessing rites, and the meals shared by all guests. Sr. Victoria facilitated the games. The homeless guests were joined in by Sisters and other attendees who all competed in different Filipino party games and participants received winning and consolation prizes.

Youth Camp Held in Tanay

On July 27 and 28, 2023, Tuluyan scholars with Sr. Theodora, and some SPA and Tuluyan staff travelled to St. Scholastica's Farm in Tanay, Rizal for an overnight bonding, reflection, nature appreciation, sharing, and enrichment.

Tuluyan Scholars Hya, Angel, Elvan, Allen, Reynaldo, Efren, and Cyrus met with Sr. Theodora and SPA/Tuluyan staff at St. Scholastica's College Manila at around 6 AM, to travel to Tanay, Rizal. The group arrived safe and early at the farm, and



after eating breakfast, began and participated in activities such as nature appreciation and bonding. The scholars went around the farm, observed the flora and fauna, and were asked to appreciate in silence the different sounds, rustles, and movements in the ecosystems present in the farm. Lunch followed. Afterwards, the scholars engaged in a sharing session and fun activity with the SPA and Tuluyan staff, talking about their personal experiences, sharing about Jesus Christ and their thoughts on prayer, the divinity and humanity of Christ, and their relationship with God. The scholars shared and opened up on certain personal things, in relation to the topics being shared, as well as enjoyed some good fun and banter among themselves and with the SPA and Tuluyan staff.

The group also visited the chapel, the spring and little brook, and the marang plantation area, among others, at the farm.
